Let's all meet in Chapel Hill on June 22, and throw a four day "recover from the comet" party! Then we can go home and recover from the party.

Seriously though, June 22 marks opening day of the 1986 SEPA Conference and, contrary to popular belief, a SEPA Conference isn't a four-day party. it is, is four of the most intense and you will enlightening days track record experience. SEPA's success is based upon participation. your part to maintain the continuity of this tradition. If you can't attend the conference, don't despair. By renewing your membership you will continue to receive the SEPA Journal and other benefits of membership, including special mailings and access to the SEPA script bank and mailing list.



Following the SEPA Conference by less than a week is the International Planetarium Society (IPS) Conference, This year's meeting will be held in Tucson, Arizona, from June 29 through July 4. Included in this week-long conference is a tour to Kitt Peak, with optional tours to the Multiple Mirror Telescope (MMT) and various historical/scenic sites.

I will be representing SEPA at the IPS Council meeting. One item of business that will be discussed, and possibly acted upon, will be the choice of the 1990 conference site. Richmond, Virginia has already been chosen for the 1988 meeting. Two formal invitations have been extended for the 1990 conference; Paris, France, and Borlange, Sweden. A Paris meeting would be hosted by the planetarium at La Villette, "the world's largest science center." The proposal was in very general terms and mentioned nearby astronomical and historical sites, as well as hotels, food, transportation, etc. The meeting dates were proposed for July, with mention of a possible group trip, before or after, to the total solar eclipse in Finland. See Southern Skies, September 1985, for the details of the Borlange proposal. I hope to have additional information on these proposals by the SEPA Conference and will discuss them and other IPS business with you at that time. I will, of course, carry any mandates from the SEPA membership to the IPS Council meeting.
